

# **2017 Annual Report**

This report has been prepared to comply with Australian Government requirements.

#### The School

Launceston Christian School is a Christian school community in the Tamar Valley in Northern Tasmania. We are a registered Kindergarten to Year 12 day school with a total enrolment of 656 students. The school is owned and operated by an Association - Launceston Christian School (Inc.). The School exists to enter and maintain strong partnerships with parents who desire their children to be taught from and equipped with a biblical world view. Situated on about 10 hectares, LCS is in the Launceston suburb of Riverside, on the western bank of the Tamar River. The School's Vision Statement is: 'To glorify and honour God through Christ-centred education'. Our Core Values are: To live in obedience to God, To act with humility, integrity and fairness, To work with creativity and diligence, To encourage participation and teamwork and To be trustworthy and accountable to one another. Our School Motto is: In Christ Wisdom and Knowledge.

The average, daily rate of attendance for teaching staff at Launceston School in 2017 was 95.25%

### Staff attendance Staff retention

Fifty-eight teachers were actively employed at Launceston Christian School at the end of 2017. Fifty-three of these continued in active employment at LCS at the commencement of 2018. Two teachers retired, one took up a teaching post at another school and two completed their short-term contracts.

All teachers employed at Launceston Christian School in 2017 were registered with the Tasmanian Teachers Registration Board (TRB).

Expenditure and teacher participation in professional learning.

In July LCS teachers attended the CEN State conference in Hobart on the theme of Learning and Teaching. All Staff successfully completed the 'Apply First Aid' Certificate Training at the start of the school year.

Teachers engaged in professional learning in specific curriculum areas through attendance at conferences conducted by professional organisations and other providers. In addition, Secondary teachers have completed 'in house' professional learning in AITSL Goal Setting, Effective Feedback, Continuous Reporting, Biblical Worldview, and National Consistent Collection of Data for students with disabilities. Junior School staff focused on reviewing and writing curriculum documentation for the Arts, moderating writing and evaluating spelling programs. Staff also worked in cluster groups as part of the Reflective Practice Program based on improving teaching practice. Teacher Aides participated in professional development sessions that covered a broad range of topics including personal and professional expectations, gratitude, NAPLAN and a review of the UK Education Endowment Fund's report and recommendations into the function and use of Teacher Aides in schools.

A positive percentage in the right hand column is indicative of improvement between 2016 and 2017. A negative percentage indicates that the percentage in 2016 was higher than that in 2017.

The number of students in each Year group at Launceston Christian School is relatively small and the figures do not compare results for the same group of students. It should also be noted that, at various levels in the school, new students are enrolled between one year and the next. We have noted that this can have a disproportionate impact on the proportion of students testing as below the hearthmark

The School remains committed to improving literacy and numeracy standards for all students, including its commitment to the 'performance target' of having all students performing above the National Minimum Standard.
